FY 2023 SMART POLICING INITIATIVE GRANT PROGRAM



Who May Apply:

State, local, tribal, and campus law enforcement agencies; governmental nonlaw enforcement agencies acting as their fiscal agent; federally recognized Indian tribal governments that perform law enforcement functions; tribal consortia consisting of two or more federally recognized Indian tribes (including tribal consortia operated as nonprofit organizations) acting as a fiscal agent for one or more tribal law enforcement agencies

Why Apply:

Receive funding to support innovative and evidence-based policing practices, more effective information sharing, and multiagency collaboration.

Maximum per Award:

• Up to \$800,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not received BJA funding before.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Test and implement innovative approaches to common law enforcement challenges.
- Develop and test new approaches for engaging law enforcement in community violence intervention.
- Develop, implement, and test new information-sharing technologies.
- Engage a research partner to document implementation, measure outcomes, and contribute to the development of toolkits and guidance for the field.
- Foster collaborations to increase public safety.

How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Registerin <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by by May 1, 2023.
- (2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by May 10, 2023. The application's major elements are:
 - (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
 - (b) The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
 - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
