Who May Apply:	Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; for-profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses			
Why Apply:	Receive funding to administer a competitive microgrant program and provide training and technical assistance (TTA) to state, local, and tribal agencies working to protect vulnerable people in prisons, jails, and other confinement settings, and to reduce reliance on restrictive or punitive approaches. Vulnerable people include, but are not limited to, those with one or more physical disability, severe/persistent mental illness, or who are LGBTQ+, youthful inmates in adult facilities, blind, deaf, or non-English speaking.			
Maximum per Award:	 One award of \$2,500,000. At least 50 percent of the total award (i.e., \$1,250,000) must be awarded as microgrants with a maximum total of \$50,000. 			
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	 Institutions that have not previously received BJA funding. 			
	 Organizations that possess substantial experience working in confinement settings to protect people who are vulnerable from being victimized. 			
	 Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.	
	(1) Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by June 13, 2024.	
	(2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by June 20, 2024. The application's major elements are:	
	(a) The proposal abstract that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).	
	(b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.	
	(c) The web-based budget form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
