Why Apply:	Receive funding to implement virtual reality (VR) technology designed to provide crisis response training and ensure law enforcement is effective at facilitating de-escalation skills while enhancing responses to individuals in crisis.	
Maximum per Award:	Up to \$800,000	
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	 Agencies that have not received BJA funding before. Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities. 	
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	 Report on the existing technology platform and assess how integrating VR tools will add value. Create and/or enhance agency-wide strategy for integration of immersive VR scenario-based training. Develop evidence-based course content and scenarios using the VR technology. 	 Track and assess activities undertaken with the new technology. Work with the training and technical assistance provider to share policy and practices among the agencies participating in the program. Improve the responses to individuals in crisis and the deescalation skills of participants.

How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by June 29, 2023.
- (2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by July 6, 2023. The application's major elements are:
 - (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
 - (b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
 - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
