# PROSECUTING COLD CASES USING DNA

#### **Program Summary**

Designed to aid prosecutors, the Prosecuting Cold Cases Using DNA Program provides funding to support agencies in the resolution of violent cold case crimes.

## **Program Objectives**

- Prosecution of cold cases involving violent crime where suspects have been identified through DNA evidence.
- Decrease in the number of unresolved violent cold case crimes awaiting prosecution.

## **Program Accomplishments**

- Multiple suspect profiles uploaded to Combined DNA Index System (CODIS), Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System (IAFIS/AFIS).
- 78 suspects who were initially unknown, are now identified.
- 19 cases have resulted in convictions.
- 30 suspects were identified via forensic genetic genealogy work.
- 46 cases have been charged and/or indicted.
- 78 cold cases have been resolved/closed.

#### **Program Requirements**

- A prosecutorial body must be a fully engaged project partner.
- Suspects' DNA profiles have already been generated (can be known or unknown suspects).
- Utilization of Forensic Genetic Genealogy must follow the "DOJ Interim Policy Forensic Genetic Genealogical DNA Analysis and Searching."
