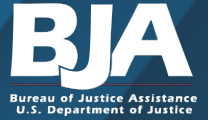

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Reporting Deaths from the Full Universe

Universe of Reporting Agencies



The universe of reporting agencies may include but is not limited to:

- Local Law Enforcement Agencies/Facilities
 - Police Departments
 - Sheriff Offices
 - Municipal or County Jails
 - Lock-up/Holding Cells
- State Law Enforcement Agencies and Correctional Facilities
 - State Police
 - Highway Patrol
 - State Prisons
 - Private Facilities under Contract with the State
 - State-run Boot Camp Prisons
 - Contracted Boot Camp Prisons
- Other Local or State Correctional Facilities
 - Juvenile Facilities
 - Halfway Houses or Treatment Facilities (operated by or under contract with the state)

A state's universe of reporting agencies may include any agency with police or arresting powers.

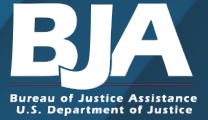
How to Determine Your Universe of Reporting Agencies



State Administering Agencies (SAAs) can use the following resources to help determine their universe of reporting agencies.

- Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) Census of State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies
- Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program
- BJS National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) Program
- BJS Annual Survey of Jails (ASJ)

Contracted Out-of-State Facilities



If a state contracts with an out-of-state facility to house incarcerated individuals, the state that is in physical possession of the decedent is responsible for reporting the death in custody.

Example: Idaho Department of Correction contracts with Saguaro Correctional Center in Eloy, AZ. Although these incarcerated individuals are under the jurisdiction of Idaho, Arizona's SAA should report any deaths in custody at the facility.*

Open Source



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- Refers to free, publicly accessible databases that collect and compile information for awareness and use in research.
- Open-source databases that collect law enforcement data include but are not limited to:
 - Mapping Police Violence
 - Washington Post Fatal Force

Open Source Example



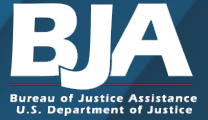
The Washington Post Fatal Force

- Since January 1, 2015, *The Washington Post* has logged fatal police shootings in the United States via their Fatal Force Database.
- Individuals can search the database using several variables such as victim's name, victim's age, victim's race, city, state, police department, and year of shooting.
- The database is user-friendly and provides links to news sources. The data can also be exported to an Excel file.

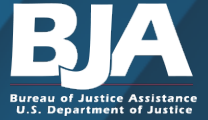
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Medical Examiners/Coroners



- Consider partnering with medical examiners/coroners (ME/Cs) as a source of DCRA data.
- Some states have laws in place that require all "in-custody" and "arrest-related" deaths to be investigated and/or reported to ME/Cs.
- When working with ME/Cs, take care to see what gaps they have in their data.

Zero Report



- If reporting “0” deaths during a reporting period, BJA will reach out to SAAs to confirm that they have not identified any deaths using their current data collection practices.
- BJA recommends that state and local agencies submit zero reports to the SAAs in any reporting period that a death does not occur as a best practice for a more comprehensive data collection.
