The Prosecuting Cold Cases Using DNA Program is designed to aid prosecutors and provides funding to support agencies in the resolution of violent crime and cold cases.

Program Objectives

- Prosecution of cold cases involving violent crime where suspects have been identified through DNA evidence.
- Decrease in the number of unresolved violent crime cold cases awaiting prosecution.

Program Accomplishments

- Multiple suspect profiles uploaded to CODIS and IAFIS/AFIS.
- Overtime granted to work cold cases.
- Numerous cases with suspect DNA identified are pending prosecution.
- Three suspects have been charged and are awaiting trial.

Program Requirements

- A prosecutorial body must be a fully engaged project partner.
- Suspects' DNA profiles have already been obtained (can be known or unknown suspects).
- Forensic genetic genealogy must follow DOJ interim policy.
