Who May Apply:	Small businesses; For-profit organizations other than small businesses; Nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status, other than institutions of higher education; Private, public, and state-controlled institutions of higher education		
Why Apply:	Receive funding for reentry-related learning and funding opportunities, as well as resources for various audiences, including state, local, and tribal governments; service providers; nonprofit organizations; corrections institutions; individuals returning home to their communities from incarceration and their families; and other stakeholders.		
Maximum per Award:	Varies by category, from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000		
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	 Agencies that have not received BJA funding before. Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities. 		
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	 Develop and test strategies and programs to assist youth and adults as they transition out of detention and incarceration. Administer the National Adult and Juvenile Reentry Resource Center, a reentry clearinghouse for criminal justice practitioners. Improve reentry systems with the goal of reducing recidivism. How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.		
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by July 25, 2023.		
	(2)Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by August 1, 2023. The application's major elements are:		
	(a) The proposal abstract that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).		
	(b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.		
	(c) The web-based budget form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
