Who May Apply:	Federally recognized Native American tribal governments; Consortia consisting of two or more federally recognized Indian Tribes; Tribal designees eligible for certain activities related to Purpose Area #6.	
Why Apply:	This solicitation combines seven of the Department of Justice's tribal government-specific competitive solicitations into one, requiring only one application. Receive funding from BJA to engage in three purpose areas (PAs):	
	PA 2: Justice system strategic planning.	
	• PA 3: Develop and enhance adult tribal justice systems ranging from law enforcement to courts to corrections.	
	• PA 4: Renovate, expand, replace, or build tribal justice-related facilities.	
Maximum per Award:	 PA 2: \$150,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance (TTA) 	
	• PA 3: up to \$900,000 per award, including no-cost TTA	
	 PA 4: up to \$1,600,000 per award (single jurisdiction facility); up to \$5,600,000 (regional facility)

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.	
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by March 5, 2024.	
	(2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by March 12, 2024. The application's major elements are:	
	(a) The proposal abstract that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).	
	(b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.	
	(c) The web-based budget form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
