Who May Apply:

Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; for-profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses

Why Apply:

Receive funding to establish a coordinated hate crimes resource center. The resource center will serve as single location for communities to access the latest promising practices, research, and implementation support from across many disciplines to address hate crimes.

BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

Maximum per Award:

• Up to \$2,000,000

Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Assess the needs of the criminal justice field and associated communities and develop strategies to expand awareness and build skills and knowledge surrounding hate crimes.
- Collaborate and coordinate with providers, federal partners, and interest groups on topics related to hate crimes.
- Develop cadre of trainers and subject matter experts that reflect a mix of experiences and perspectives to be able to effectively reach communities impacted by and practitioners responding to hate crimes.

- Serve as a thought leader and information clearinghouse for relevant hate crimes research and best practices.
- Create knowledge diffusion products (e.g., fact sheets, webinars) and disseminate them through BJA's networks.
- Develop tools to address gaps in existing hate crimes resources.

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How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by July 8, 2024.
- (2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by July 15, 2024. The application's major elements are:
- (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
 - (b) The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
 - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
