Who May Apply:	State, county, city, or township governments; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized) and tribal organizations; Special district governments; Nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status; Small businesses; For-profit organizations; Public, private, and state-controlled institutions of higher education		
Why Apply:	Receive funding to support four national training and technical assistance (TTA) categories to support law enforcement (LE) and criminal justice stakeholders in key criminal justice operations. The four categories are: Enhancing Task Force Leadership, Operations, and Management TTA; Specialized Units TTA; Crime Gun Intelligence Center (CGIC) TTA; and Police Recruiting and Retention Among Underrepresented Groups.		
Maximum per Award:	Varies by category, from \$475,000 to \$1,000,000		
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	 Agencies that have not received BJA funding before. Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities. 		
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	 Category 1: Deliver TTA and guidance that addresses the management, organization, and operation of multijurisdictional law enforcement and tribal task forces. Category 2: Develop consensus guidance that improves the creation and/or evaluation of specialized law enforcement units focused on violent crime reduction. Category 3: Deliver onsite, indepth TTA to departments that are implementing crime gun 	 intelligence centers as a means of improving investigations related to shootings as well as provide site assessments for CGIC grantees. Category 4: Provide specialized TTA to communities and policing agencies with an emphasis on broadening applicant pools to include historically underrepresented groups and strengthening career/education pipelines leading to careers in policing and criminal justice.

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.		
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by August 5, 2024.		
	(2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by August 12, 2024. The application's major elements are:		
	(a) The proposal abstract that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).		
	(b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.		
	(c) The web-based budget form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
