**GRANTS.GOV:** APRIL 29, 2024

JUSTGRANTS: MAY 6, 2024

Who May Apply:	State, county, city, or township governments, as well as public and state- controlled institutions of higher education
Why Apply:	Receive funding to defray the costs associated with postconviction DNA testing in cases of violent felony offenses (as defined by state law) in which actual innocence might be demonstrated. This includes activities such as reviewing suitable postconviction cases, locating and analyzing biological evidence, improving the preservation of biological evidence, and modernizing record retention for relevant postconviction cases.
Maximum per Award:	<ul> <li>Up to \$1,000,000 for Purpose Area 1 (case reviews and DNA testing)</li> <li>Up to \$500,000 for Purpose Area 2 (preservation of biological evidence and modernization of record storage)</li> </ul>
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	<ul> <li>Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.</li> <li>Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.</li> </ul>
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	<ul> <li>Review postconviction cases to identify those in which DNA testing could prove the innocence of a person convicted of a violent felony offense.</li> <li>Perform DNA analysis of appropriate biological evidence and report and review the DNA test results.</li> <li>Locate biological evidence associated with postconviction cases.</li> <li>Modernize evidence retention practices for biological evidence in accordance with best practices.</li> <li>Modernize and digitize the storage of existing files and records in adjudicated cases.</li> </ul>

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by April 29, 2024.
	(2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by May 6, 2024. The application's major elements are:
	(a) The <b>proposal abstract</b> that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
	(b) The <b>proposal narrative</b> that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
	(c) The <b>web-based budget</b> form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
