FY 2024 NATIONAL SEXUAL ASSAULT KIT INITIATIVE (SAKI)



Who May Apply:

State law enforcement agencies; Units of local government; Governmental nonlaw enforcement agencies acting as fiscal agents; Prosecutor's offices; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized); Small law enforcement agencies or a consortia of small agencies; Jurisdictions that have clearly demonstrated they have addressed their downstream cases. See solicitation for more specific details.

Why Apply:

Receive funding to improve state and local jurisdictions' capacities to respond to violent crime through the investigation and prosecution of cases resulting from sexual assault kit (SAK) evidence and the collection of lawfully owed DNA from convicted offenders.

Maximum per Award:

• From \$1,000,000 to \$2,500,000 depending on the Purpose Area

BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Provide resources to address unsubmitted sexual assault kits (SAKs) (including partially tested kits) in custody that have not been submitted to a forensic laboratory for testing with Combined DNA Index System (CODIS)-eligible DNA methodologies.
- Establish SAK evidence tracking systems and case management systems related to sexual assault and other violent crime cold cases. Utilize other advanced DNA methodologies and investigative techniques to enhance investigation and/or prosecution capacity.
- Enhance victim services and support for past and current victims of sexual assault. This can include soft interview rooms to ensure an optimal environment for victim interviews and interactions.
- Increase capacity for traumainformed investigations and
 prosecutions in connection with
 evidence and cases resulting
 from the SAK testing process,
 as well as other violent cold
 case crimes. This can include
 the support of personnel
 costs (including overtime) for
 investigative and prosecutorial
 staff, crime analysis, and/or
 victim advocacy, as well as the
 establishment of cold case
 investigation units.
- Provide sites with resources to collect lawfully DNA samples from qualifying individuals who should have a sample in CODIS, but from whom a sample has never been collected or submitted to a laboratory for testing, as well as developing/ reforming policies for arrestee collections.

How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by July 29, 2024.
- (2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by August 5, 2024. The application's major elements are:
 - (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
 - (b) The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
 - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
