## FY 2024 IMPROVING SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TREATMENT AND RECOVERY OUTCOMES FOR ADULTS IN REENTRY



Who May Apply:

State, city or township, county, special district, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized), as well as nonprofits that are not institutions of higher education

Why Apply:

Receive funding to establish, expand, or improve treatment and recovery support services for people with substance use disorders (SUDs) or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders during their incarceration and upon reentry into their communities.

Maximum per Award:

• \$833,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Implementation or expansion of SUD or co-occurring mental health disorder treatment recovery support services
- Recovery support services
- Hiring personnel
- Medication and other supplies to support SUD programming, harm reduction, or reentry
- Transitional or recovery housing
- Screening and assessment tools
- Information sharing
- Process and outcome evaluation

## How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by May 6, 2024.
- (2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by May 13, 2024. The application's major elements are:
- (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
  - (b) The proposal narrative that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
  - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
