

# FY 2024 STOP SCHOOL VIOLENCE PROGRAM COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION

### Who May Apply:

Under Category 1: state governments or public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education

Under Category 2: city or township, county, and other units of local government; federally recognized Native American tribal governments; nonprofits with or without a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; independent school districts; and private institutions of higher education

### Why Apply:

Receive funding to prevent violence in K–12 school settings by implementing behavioral threat assessments and/or intervention teams, technological solutions such as anonymous reporting technology, and other school safety strategies that assist in preventing school-based violence

### Maximum per Award:

- Category 1: up to \$2,000,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance.
- Category 2: up to \$1,000,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance.

### BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Entities that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

### Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Develop and operate technology solutions.
- Develop and implement multidisciplinary behavioral threat assessment and/or intervention teams.
- Train school personnel on preventing school violence.
- Educate students on how to prevent school violence.
- Provide training for law enforcement working in schools.
- Hire school support personnel to prevent school violence.

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## How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

- (1) Register in [Grants.gov](https://grants.gov) and follow the prompts to submit two forms by June 12, 2024.
  - (2) Then complete the full application in [JustGrants.usdoj.gov](https://justgrants.usdoj.gov) by June 20, 2024. The application's major elements are:
    - (a) The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
    - (b) The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
    - (c) The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
