What is the Office of Justice Programs?

- The Office of Justice Programs (OJP)
 provides grant funding, training,
 research, and statistics to the criminal
 justice community.
- OJP is one of three grant-making components of the Department of Justice along with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).

PROGRAM OVERVIEW





Initiative Overview

- BJA seeks to support small and rural agencies in their efforts to combat violent crime.
- This program will provide funding to small and/or rural agencies and/or to prosecutors who are interested in implementing or improving the capacity of their organization around one or more critical elements found in the <u>Violent</u> <u>Crime Reductions Operations Guide</u> or the <u>Prosecutors'</u> <u>Guide to Reducing Violence and Building Safer</u> <u>Communities.</u>



Activities

- Complete the <u>Violent Crime Reduction</u> <u>Operations Guide</u> online assessment tool.
- Select one or more of the critical elements within the Guide to improve capacity as part of an overall violent crime reduction strategy.
- Partner with a researcher or subject matter expert to monitor the activities identified for the project.




Activities (cont'd)

- Implement programming and activities that reflect an enhanced capacity, per the Guide.
- Deploy agency resources such as personnel, services, or analytical tools that meet the capacity enhancement goal.
- Document the development and implementation of strategies to reduce the violent crime problem(s) identified in the application.
- Track progress and outcomes.
- Additional program activities are outlined in the solicitation.



Violent Crime Reduction Operations Guide

- The Guide outlines Critical Elements
 that discuss important capabilities for any
 agency in its fight against violent crime,
 including the most essential, overarching
 element: leadership.
- Law enforcement leaders can use this Guide and its Critical Elements as a resource to assess their agency's capacity and identify additional actions that can assist them in their fight against violent crime.





Violent Crime Reduction Operations Guide (cont'd)

• The Guide outlines the Critical Elements, essential components of crime-fighting strategies, in a format that can assist agency executives in determining their respective capacity in each of these areas.





Violent Crime Reduction Operations Guide Assessment Tool

- The purpose of this self-assessment tool is to help the responding agency identify areas in which it might want to increase its violent crime reduction capacities and capabilities.
- The tool is meant to help an agency identify a continuum of capacity and serve as a means for that agency to identify areas in which it may want to improve and build capacity.

SECTION 3

ELIGIBILITY AND APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS





Eligibility

- This solicitation is limited to small law enforcement agencies, to include prosecutors, and agencies serving rural communities, to include prosecutors serving rural communities or small departments.
- The following entities are eligible to apply for this funding opportunity:
 - A small agency is any law enforcement agency with 250 or fewer sworn officers.
 - A rural agency, as defined under this initiative, is (a) an agency serving any area or community, no part of which is within an area designated as a standard metropolitan statistical area by the Office of Management and Budget or (b) any agency serving one or more rural census tracts.
 - A tribal agency is any federally recognized tribe with a designated law enforcement agency.



Available Funding

- Funding Available
 - \$300,000 maximum dollar amount.
 - 36 anticipated awards.
 - Funding begins October 1, 2023, for 36 months.



Previous Program Funding

- Previous funding through this program has been used to support efforts to combat various rural violent crime challenges, including:
 - Gang-related violent crime
 - Narcotics-related violent crime
 - Firearms-related violent crime
 - Assaults, robberies, and sexual assaults
 - Child abuse and exploitation
 - Homicides
 - Kidnappings
 - Intimate partner violence



Previous Funding Success Stories

 The Vail, Colorado, Police Department, Eagle County District Attorney's Office, Eagle County Department of Health and Human Services, along with numerous community partners, launched the Mountain Safe Program. This program services collaboration designed to reduce violent crime and victimization, especially among youth and the Spanish-speaking population.



Previous Funding Success Stories (cont'd)

 The Ashland, Alabama, Police Department sought to create better responses to crime-challenged areas using problem-oriented policing and technology such as pole cameras and a mobile camera trailer. Ashland used its mobile trailer to reduce violent criminal activity in one area by up to 60 percent over a 5-month period.



Previous Funding Success Stories (cont'd)

 The Tamaqua Police Department, Pennsylvania, is addressing the issue of sexual assault and related violent crime through a series of partner trainings and increased cross-sector collaboration. The scheduling of training opportunities for initiative partners is underway for much of 2023, and the site reports strong community interest in its work.



Previous Funding Success Stories (cont'd)

- The Comanche, Texas, Police Department seeks to reduce human and narcotics trafficking and child exploitation through the implementation of automated license plate readers (ALPRs) and the use of forensic software.
- ALPRs were strategically placed throughout various high crime areas. These efforts led to multiple seizures and confiscation of numerous narcotics, fentanyl pills, cocaine, and other drugs. The Comanche Police Department also mined nearly 400 gigabytes of data for several cases, including murder, assault, and burglary.



Things to Keep in Mind

- Applicants should reference the <u>Violent Crime</u> <u>Reductions Operations Guide</u> or the <u>Prosecutors' Guide to Reducing Violence</u> <u>and Building Safer Communities</u> throughout their application as stated in the solicitation.
- The program timeline should highlight and include major milestones and deliverables.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What should be included in my application?

A: Please review the "Application and Submission Information" section of the solicitation, beginning on page 13. What is needed are: proposal abstract, narrative, budget worksheet, budget narrative, timeline, résumés, etc.

Q: Can my organization propose to partner with other entities?

A: Yes. Partnering with other entities is allowable but only one entity may submit the application and assume fiscal/management responsibilities. We encourage applicants to identify those partner organizations within the application, when possible.

▲ SAM.gov Entity Validation Update ℰ

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases longer.

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read this FAQ for more information.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grant Application Resource Guide ("Guide") provides guidance to assist OJP grant applicants in preparing and submitting applications for OJP funding. It addresses a variety of policies, statutes, and regulations that apply to many (or in some cases, all) OJP program applicants, or to grants and cooperative agreements awarded in fiscal year (FY) 2023. Some OJP programs may have program solicitations that expressly modify a provision of this Guide; in such cases, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in the solicitation as to any such expressly modified provision.

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

- Step 1: Submit an SF-424 and an SF-LLL at Grants.gov.
- <u>Step 2</u>: Submit the full application, with attachments, at <u>JusticeGrants.usdoj.gov</u>.

NOTE: Submission deadline times for both Grants.gov and JustGrants are now 8:59 p.m. ET, not 11:59 p.m. ET as in past years.
