

## Types of BJA Grants

#### **Formula**

- Are usually administered and managed by State Administering Agencies or other BJA-approved fiscal agents
- Are most often on a noncompetitive basis
- Distribution of funds to eligible recipients is either statutorily defined or defined by a distribution process that is specified by BJA

#### **Discretionary**

- Applicants apply directly to OJP/BJA
- Most often awarded on a competitive basis
- Applications undergo a preliminary review process to ensure that they are complete and meet the eligibility requirements and many are also peer reviewed
- Awarded <u>directly</u> by OJP to eligible recipients

## Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

JAG is OJP's flagship grant program and the leading source of federal justice funding to state, local, and tribal jurisdictions. There are nine broad purpose areas:

- 1) Law enforcement programs
- 2) Prosecution and court programs
- Crime prevention and education programs
- Corrections and community corrections, including reentry
- 5) <u>Drug treatment and enforcement</u> <u>programs</u>

- 6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement
- 7) Crime victim and witness programs (non-compensation)
- 8) <u>Mental health programs</u> (and related law enforcement and corrections programs, including behavioral programs and crisis intervention teams)
- 9) Implementation of state crisis intervention court proceedings and related programs or initiatives (including but not limited to mental health courts, drug courts, veterans' courts, and extreme risk protection order programs)



#### **Eligible Applicants**

- **JAG State awards:** Only states may apply under this solicitation, and states must designate a single SAA that has authority to apply on their behalf.
- JAG Local awards: Only units of local government appearing on the JAG Allocations List may apply under this solicitation.

#### **FY23 Awards**

- JAG State awards: 56 awards totaling \$209,416,792
- JAG Local awards: 949 awards totaling \$96,562,411

#### Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program (SCIP)

Funds to states to implement state crisis intervention court proceedings and related programs or initiatives, including, but not limited to, ERPO programs that work to keep guns out of the hands of those who pose a threat to themselves or others, mental health courts, drug courts, and veterans treatment courts.

- Implementing Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) programs
- Training those implementing ERPO programs
- Communication, education, and public awareness of ERPO
- Funds may <u>not</u> be used, either directly or indirectly, to support the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government.

- Specialized court-based programs such as drug, mental health, and veterans treatment courts, including those that specifically accept clients with firearm violations
- Behavioral health deflection for those at risk to themselves or others
- Funding for law enforcement agencies to safely secure, store, track, and return relinquished guns

#### \$750 million for 5 years

- 150 million per year (FY 2022 FY 2026)
- 51 FY22-23 awards made \$248,143,943



### Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) for State Prisoners Formula Program

#### Who May Apply?

State governments

#### Why Apply?

Receive formula funding to assist states with developing and implementing residential substance use disorder (SUD) treatment programs within state correctional facilities, as well as within local correctional and detention facilities, in which persons are incarcerated for a period of time sufficient to permit SUD treatment.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$4,395,000

### Adult Treatment Court Program

#### Who May Apply?

- State, special district, city or township, county, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public housing and Indian housing authorities
- State agencies involved with the provision of substance use and/or mental health services

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to plan, implement, and enhance adult treatment courts for individuals involved with the justice system who have substance use disorders, including stimulant, opioid, and other substances.

#### Maximum per Award

- Up to \$900,000 per award for planning and implementation
- Up to \$1,000,000 per award for enhancement
- Up to \$2,500,000 per award for statewide,

All include no-cost technical assistance

## Collaborative Crisis Response and Intervention Training Program

#### Who May Apply?

- City or township, county, or state governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public and state-controlled institutions of higher education with on-campus police departments

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to implement crisis response and intervention training (CRIT) that will support law enforcement, correctional, probation and parole, and sheriff's department officers on how to effectively partner with mental health, substance use disorder, and community service agencies to improve responses to individuals in crisis who have behavioral health conditions or intellectual, developmental, or physical disabilities.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$250,000 per award

### **Community Courts Initiative**

#### Who May Apply?

- City or township, county, state. and Native American tribal (federally recognized) governments
- State, city, township, county, or tribal government acting directly or through agreements with other public or private entities on behalf of a single community court

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to support neighborhood-focused court programs that combine the power of the community and the justice system to address community safety, public health, and other social issues occurring within a jurisdiction.

#### **Maximum per Award**

Up to \$900,000 per award

#### Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Use Site-based Program (COSSUP)

#### Who May Apply?

- City or township governments
- County governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- State governments
- Other

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to develop, implement, or expand comprehensive programs that address the overdose crisis and the impacts of use and misuse of opioids, stimulants, or other substances.

#### Maximum per Award

- Local applications: up to \$1.6 million per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance (TTA)
- State applications: up to \$7 million per award, including TTA



## Connect and Protect: Law Enforcement Behavioral Health Response Program

#### Who May Apply?

- State governments
- County governments
- City or township governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Nonprofit or for-profit mental health agencies are eligible if they provide services as a unit of the state or local government

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to support law enforcement and behavioral health cross-system collaboration that will improve public health and safety responses to and outcomes for individuals with mental health disorders or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders.

#### Maximum per Award Up to \$550,000 per award

## Field Initiated: Encouraging Innovation

Invests in collaborations with the field and experts to prevent and reduce crime and enhance the criminal justice system through innovative approaches that accelerate justice by identifying, defining, and responding to emerging or chronic crime problems and systemic issues. BJA is looking for new approaches that address gaps in responses, build or translate research knowledge, or build capacity.

## Improving Adult and Juvenile Crisis Stabilization and Community Reentry Program

#### Who May Apply?

- State governments
- County governments
- City or township governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Community-based nonprofits and behavioral health care providers

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to enhance or implement services to improve reentry, reduce recidivism, and address the treatment and recovery needs of people with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders who are currently, or were formerly, involved in the criminal justice system.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$750,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance



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## Integrated Treatment for Individuals with Co-occurring Disorders in the Criminal Justice System

#### Who May Apply?

- o Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Private institutions of higher education
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
- o Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education
- o For-profit organizations other than small businesses
- Small businesses

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to work with BJA to lead a national TTA program and administer subawards to local demonstration sites. The program will promote cross system collaboration among justice stakeholders, behavioral health service providers and community support organizations to improve access to and integrated treatment for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders.

#### Maximum Award

Up to \$7,000,000



### Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program

#### Who May Apply?

- o City or township, county, or state governments
- Special district governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Other

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to support cross-system collaboration to improve public safety responses to and outcomes for individuals with mental health disorders (MHDs) or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MHSUDs) who come into contact with the criminal justice system or are leaving a custodial setting.

#### Maximum per Award

\$550,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

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## Kevin and Avonte Program: Reducing Injury and Death of Missing Individuals with Dementia and Developmental Disabilities

#### Who May Apply?

- State, local, and Native American law enforcement and other public safety agencies
- Health care agencies
- Nonprofit organizations that plan, design, or operate locally based, proactive programs to locate and prevent the wandering of missing individuals

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to develop a comprehensive approach that responds to and prevents the wandering of individuals with forms of dementia (such as Alzheimer's disease) or children with developmental disabilities (such as autism), or to purchase tracking technology.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$150,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

## Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP)

#### Who May Apply?


- Category 1 PDMP Implementation, Maintenance, and Enhancement Grants: state governments, Native American tribal organizations (other than federally recognized tribal governments), and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Category 2 Data-driven Response, Multistate Projects, or Advancement of PDMP: state governments, Native American tribal organizations (other than federally recognized tribal governments), Native American tribal governments (federally recognized), private, public, and state-controlled institutions of higher education, nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education), and nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education)

#### Why Apply?

- Category 1: Receive funding to implement and/or enhance PDMPs or support integration with other health information technology systems.
- o **Category 2:** Receive funding to develop and test innovative strategies or implement a multistate effort that can be replicated in other states.

#### Maximum per Award

- o Category 1: up to \$2,000,000
- o Category 2: up to \$1,000,000





Second Chance Act: Improving Substance Use Disorder Treatment and Recovery Outcomes for Adults in Reentry Program

#### • Who May Apply?

- State, city or township, county, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education)
- Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education)

#### • Why Apply?

Receive funding to establish, expand, or improve treatment and recovery support services for people with substance use disorders (SUDs) or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders (COD) during their incarceration and upon reentry into their communities.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$1,125,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance





#### Second Chance Act: Pay for Success Program

#### Who May Apply?

- State, city or township, county, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Special district governments
- Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities

#### • Why Apply?

Receive funding to purchase a wide range of reentry services tailored to individuals leaving incarceration, particularly those with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders who are currently involved in the criminal justice system, or were formerly involved, in need of permanent supportive housing.

#### Maximum per Award

Up to \$1,000,000 per award

#### **STOP School Violence**


#### • Who May Apply?

- City or township, county, or state governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Independent school districts
- Nonprofits, other than institutions of higher education
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Private institutions of higher education

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to support training that will improve school climate using school-based behavioral threat assessments and/or intervention teams to identify school violence risks among students, technological solutions shown to increase school safety such as anonymous reporting technology, and other school safety strategies that assist in preventing violence.

Maximum per Award
 Up to \$2,000,000 per award



#### **Veterans Treatment Court**

#### Who May Apply?

- City or township, county, state governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities
- Special district governments

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to plan, implement, and enhance veterans' treatment court (VTC) services, including program coordination, management of VTC participants, ensuring fidelity to the model, and recovery support services.

#### Maximum Award?

- Up to \$900,000 per award for Planning and Implementation, including no cost training and technical assistance (TTA)
- Up to \$950,000 per award for Enhancement, including no-cost TTA
- Up to \$2,500,000 per award for Statewide





## Virtual Reality De-escalation Training

#### Who May Apply?

- City or township, county, or state governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education

#### Why Apply?

Receive funding to implement virtual reality (VR) technology designed to provide crisis response training and ensure law enforcement is effective at facilitating de-escalation skills while enhancing responses to individuals in crisis.

Maximum per Award \$800,000 per award

#### Who May Apply:

State, county, city, township, or Native American tribal governments (federally recognized); public- and state-controlled institutions of higher education; and special district governments. Nonprofit or for-profit mental health agencies are eligible if they provide services as a unit of the state or local government. All applications require a demonstrated partnership through a draft Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between a justice entity and a mental health partner.

#### Why Apply:

Receive funding to support law enforcement and mental health cross-system collaboration that will improve public health and safety responses to and outcomes for individuals with mental health disorders, co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders, or intellectual and developmental disabilities.

#### Maximum per Award:

Up to \$550,000 per award

#### BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

#### Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- · Design and implement a crisis response program such as case management, crisis intervention teams, co-responder teams, and mobile
- · Training and coordination for police-mental health collaboration
- · Data collection to inform practices and develop policies
- · Resident engagement via outreach and education to improve public
- · Enhancement of officer knowledge and skills in responding to community members with mental health disorders
- · Use technology to collect calls for service data involving people with behavioral health needs

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases longer.

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read this FAQ for more information.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grant Application Resource Guide ("Guide") provides guidance to assist OJP grant applicants in preparing and submitting applications for OJP funding. It addresses a variety of policies, statutes, and regulations that apply to many (or in some cases, all) OJP program applicants, or to grants and cooperative agreements awarded in fiscal year (FY) 2023. Some OJP programs may have program solicitations that expressly modify a provision of this Guide; in such cases, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in the solicitation as to any such expressly modified provision.




