Types of BJA Grants



Formula

- Are usually administered and managed by State Administering Agencies or other BJA-approved fiscal agents
- Are most often on a noncompetitive basis
- Distribution of funds to eligible recipients is either statutorily defined or defined by a distribution process that is specified by BJA

Discretionary

- Applicants apply directly to OJP/BJA
- Most often awarded on a competitive basis
- Applications undergo a preliminary review process to ensure that they are complete and meet the eligibility requirements and many are also peer reviewed
- Awarded *directly* by OJP to eligible recipients

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

JAG is OJP's flagship grant program and the leading source of federal justice funding to state, local, and tribal jurisdictions. There are nine broad purpose areas:

- 1) Law enforcement programs
- 2) Prosecution and court programs
- 3) Crime prevention and education programs
- 4) Corrections and community corrections, including reentry
- 5) Drug treatment and enforcement programs

- 6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement
- 7) Crime victim and witness programs (non-compensation)
- 8) Mental health programs (and related law enforcement and corrections programs, including behavioral programs and crisis intervention teams)
- 9) Implementation of state crisis intervention court proceedings and related programs or initiatives (including but not limited to mental health courts, drug courts, veterans' courts, and extreme risk protection order programs)



Eligible Applicants

- JAG State awards: Only states may apply under this solicitation, and states must designate a single SAA that has authority to apply on their behalf.
- **JAG Local awards:** Only units of local government appearing on the JAG Allocations List may apply under this solicitation.

FY23 Awards

- JAG State awards: 56 awards totaling \$209,416,792
- JAG Local awards: 949 awards totaling \$96,562,411

Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program (SCIP)

Funds to states to implement state crisis intervention court proceedings and related programs or initiatives, including, but not limited to, ERPO programs that work to keep guns out of the hands of those who pose a threat to themselves or others, mental health courts, drug courts, and veterans treatment courts.

Implementing Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) programs

- Training those implementing ERPO programs
- Communication, education, and public awareness of ERPO
- Funds may <u>not</u> be used, either directly or indirectly, to support the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government.

- Specialized court-based programs such as drug, mental health, and veterans treatment courts, including those that specifically accept clients with firearm violations
- Behavioral health deflection for those at risk to themselves or others

Maximum per Award

Varies by purpose area. Up to \$1,00,000 per award.

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to prevent and reduce violent crime in communities by supporting comprehensive, evidence-based violence intervention and prevention programs.

Maximum per Award

Varies by Purpose Area. Up to \$4,00,000 per award.

Field Initiated: Encouraging Innovation

Invests in collaborations with the field and experts to prevent and reduce crime and enhance the criminal justice system through innovative approaches that accelerate justice by identifying, defining, and responding to emerging or chronic crime problems and systemic issues. BJA is looking for new approaches that address gaps in responses, build or translate research knowledge, or build capacity.

Improving Adult and Juvenile Crisis Stabilization and Community Reentry Program

Who May Apply?

- \circ State governments
- County governments
- City or township governments
- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Community based nonprofits and behavioral health care providers

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to enhance or implement services to improve reentry, reduce recidivism, and address the treatment and recovery needs of people with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders who are currently, or were formerly, involved in the criminal justice system.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$750,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance



Kevin and Avonte Program: Reducing Injury and Death of Missing Individuals with Dementia and Developmental Disabilities

Who May Apply?

- State, local, and Native American law enforcement and other public safety agencies
- Healthcare agencies
- Nonprofit organizations that plan, design, or operate locally based, proactive programs to locate and prevent the wandering of missing individuals

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to develop a comprehensive approach that responds to and prevents the wandering of individuals with forms of dementia (such as Alzheimer's disease) or children with developmental disabilities (such as autism), or to purchase tracking technology.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$150,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

Reimagining Justice: Testing a New Model of Community Safety

- Who May Apply?
 - Native American tribal governments (federally recognized) and tribal organizations
 - Nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status, other than institutions of higher education
 - $\circ\,$ Private, public, and state controlled institutions of higher education
 - $_{\odot}\,$ Local non-law enforcement government agencies

• Why Apply?

Receive funding for the development and testing of a new or innovative approach to improving community safety and trust that is an alternative to traditional enforcement mechanisms for neighborhoods experiencing high rates of less serious and low-level criminal offenses.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$2,000,000 per award





Second Chance Act Community-based Reentry Program

Who May Apply?

- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to enhance or implement evidencebased responses to improve reentry, reduce recidivism, and support successful transitional planning for individuals who are currently, or were formerly, involved in the criminal justice system.

• Maximum per Award Up to \$750,000 per award





- Second Chance Act Communitybased Incubator Initiative
- Who May Apply? Nonprofits, other than institutions of higher education
- Why Apply?

Receive funding as an intermediary organizations that will design and administer a competitive incubator initiative for community- and faith-based reentry providers, to provide subawards, oversight, and comprehensive training and technical assistance services to help build capability, capacity, and sustainability among community- and faith-based organization subawardees to meet the needs of people returning home from incarceration and to apply for and manage private and public grant funding in the future.

• Maximum Award Up to \$4,000,000





Second Chance Act: Improving Adult Reentry Education and Employment Outcomes Program

Who May Apply?

- State, city or township, county, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Public and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- \circ Independent school districts
- $\circ\,$ Nonprofits that are not institutions of higher education
- For-profit organizations other than small businesses

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to support corrections systems in implementing and expanding education and employment programs that serve individuals during incarceration and throughout the period of reentry into their communities.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$900,000 per award



Second Chance Act: Improving Substance Use Disorder Treatment and Recovery Outcomes for Adults in Reentry Program

Who May Apply?

- State, city or township, county, and Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits, other than institutions of higher education

• Why Apply?

Receive funding to establish, expand, or improve treatment and recovery support services for people with substance use disorders (SUDs) or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders (COD) during their incarceration and upon reentry into their communities.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$1,125,000 per award, including no-cost training and technical assistance

Smart Reentry: Housing Demonstration Project

• Who May Apply?

- Native American tribal governments (federally recognized)
- Nonprofits
- Why Apply?

Receive funding to assess their jurisdiction's reentry systems, identify strengths and gaps, and then build capacity for improving housing options for adults released from prison or jail.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$1,000,000 per award





STOP School Violence

Who May Apply?

- Category 1: state governments or public and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Category 2: city or township, county, or federally recognized Native American tribal governments, as well as units of local government; nonprofits with or without a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; independent school districts; and private institutions of higher education

Why Apply?

Receive funding to prevent violence in K–12 school settings by implementing behavioral threat assessments and/or intervention teams, technological solutions such as anonymous reporting technology, and other strategies that increase school safety.

Maximum per Award

Category 1: up to \$2,000,000 per award Category 2: up to \$1,000,000 per award

A SAM.gov Entity Validation Update 🖉

GSA implemented a new process to validate an entity's legal business name and physical address when requesting a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and for completing a SAM.gov entity registration. Due to a high volume of requests, entity validations are taking longer than expected to process. This validation process is now taking 7-10 business days, and in some cases longer.

OJP strongly recommends starting your SAM.gov registration process as soon as possible to allow the time necessary to process entity validations well in advance of the Grants.gov due date posted in the solicitation. Read <u>this FAQ</u> for more information.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grant Application Resource Guide ("Guide") provides guidance to assist OJP grant applicants in preparing and submitting applications for OJP funding. It addresses a variety of policies, statutes, and regulations that apply to many (or in some cases, all) OJP program applicants, or to grants and cooperative agreements awarded in fiscal year (FY) 2023. Some OJP programs may have program solicitations that expressly modify a provision of this Guide; in such cases, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in the solicitation as to any such expressly modified provision.
