

Fall 2013 Global Advisory Committee (GAC) Meeting

Recently Released Projects

Several resources have recently been approved by the GAC:



National Criminal Intelligence Sharing Plan, Version 2.0—Serves as a "refresh" to the 2003 National Criminal Intelligence Sharing Plan by providing a way forward to continue to support law enforcement's and homeland security's ability to develop and share criminal intelligence through the identification of recommendations and action items. Version 2.0 includes internal agency recommendations and action items, as well as action items on a national scope.



A Call To Action: Enhancing Officer Safety Through the Use of Event Deconfliction Systems—This "unified message" is designed to encourage law enforcement agencies to use an event deconfliction system for agency operations, to enhance officer safety. A companion Web site has also been developed, www.ncirc.gov /deconfliction. The site includes a map that identifies what systems are available in each state.



Minimum Standards for Intermediate-Level Analytic Training Courses—This resource provides the minimum training standards for intermediate-level analytic courses. Training partners developing intermediate-level analytic courses (such as comprehensive analytic training) or specialized courses (such as report writing or analytic tradecraft development) should use these standards as they develop courses for state, local, and tribal partners.

Current and Future Initiatives/Resources

- Developing a cyber-related roadmap for state, local, and tribal law enforcement and homeland security partners regarding cyber-related resources and initiatives.
- Developing minimum standards for advanced-level analytic training courses and creating an analyst professional development roadmap to assist in the institutionalization of the analytic field in law enforcement agencies.
- ▶ Developing guidance for law enforcement agencies to utilize as they research, procure, and use technology in law enforcement operations and the potential P/CRCL implications of the use of such equipment.
- ▶ Developing a checklist for new law enforcement agency executives as they assess agency operations, focusing on potential privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties (P/CRCL) issues.
