CICC Mission Statement

The CICC is charged with advising and providing recommendations to the U.S. Attorney General on issues relating to advancing the use of technology, standards, and collaboration among agencies or organizations in the area of criminal intelligence. The CICC serves as an advocate for local law enforcement agencies in their efforts to develop and share criminal intelligence for the promotion of public safety and the security of our nation.

Membership Updates

Director Vernon Keenan was appointed as the new CICC chair in March 2014, replacing Mr. Bart R. Johnson, who took a position with the Transportation Security Administration in Albany, New York.

Deputy Chief Mike Downing was appointed as the new CICC vice chair.

One of foundational tenets of the CICC is representation from national law enforcement and homeland security agencies and associations. To continue to ensure that the CICC is the voice of state, local, and tribal law enforcement and homeland security agencies, three new members have been appointed to the CICC:

- Chief William Denke (representing IACP's Indian Country Law Enforcement Section)—Chief Denke is the Chief of Police for the Sycuan Tribal Police Department.
- » Chief John Batiste (at-large member)—Chief Batiste is the Chief of the Washington State Patrol.
- » **Director Mark Gwyn** (representing the Association of State Criminal Investigative Agencies)—Director Gwyn is the Director for the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation.

Current and Future Initiatives/Resources

- Updating the CICC Business Plan to reflect the current vision, mission, and priorities of the CICC.
- Developing minimum standards for advanced-level analytic training courses and creating an analyst professional development road map to assist in the institutionalization of the analytic field in law enforcement agencies.
- Developing guidance for law enforcement agencies to utilize as they research, procure, and use technology in law enforcement operations and the potential P/CRCL implications of the use of such equipment.
- Developing a checklist for new law enforcement agency executives as they assess agency operations, focusing on potential privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties (P/CRCL) issues.
- Developing standards for computer-based training programs.

- The CICC's Training Task Team will be meeting on June 26.
- The CICC's Privacy Task Team will be meeting in late July/early August.
- The CICC will be meeting on September 15 in El Paso, Texas, at the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC).
