










BJA is seeking a training and technical assistance provider to help states raise the standard for collection and use of criminal justice data in policy, practice, and resource decision making.

### **Project overview**

Phase 1: Develop standards Phase 2: Disseminate with tools Phase 3: Help states adopt



## Phase 1: Develop standards for state and local jurisdictions and agencies to aggregate data at state and national levels

should be collected about activities and outcomes at all stages of case processing

Define additional priorities for data collection about people, places, operations, and costs that inform crime prevention and reduction

Develop data sharing, linkage, and analysis standards to yield a comprehensive picture of system activities, outcomes, and effectiveness



## Phase 2: Develop tools and make them available to states and other interested jurisdictions

Self-assessment tools for each type of agency

Recommendations for how state should use data to make decisions

Planning guides for agencies and for state leaders to make progress towards data-driven decision making Model directives to govern data sharing and access, and to ensure compliance with privacy laws



## Phase 3: Facilitate states' adoption of standards and guidelines through education and assistance.

Provide education about standards through: a website that provides resources to the field, regional or national convenings that assist in the use of tools

Facilitate competitive opportunities for states to receive assistance to improve their data practices in one or more areas, based on results of a self assessment



#### Reinvent the wheel... or don't.

May propose a combination of new and existing models, resources, and/or tools


If use of existing items is proposed, include letters of support outlining specific commitments from the proprietors

Successful applicant will also be responsible to incorporate other relevant OJP and BJA data initiatives



### The project team should look like a wheel.

Propose a hub and spoke model to convene and manage a group that represents expertise in all relevant topics
