

FY 2017 Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based Program and Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program

Project Description: The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based Program and Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) further the Department of Justice’s and the Attorney General’s priorities to combat opioid abuse, addiction, and overdose. The program provides support for jurisdictions to plan, develop, and implement comprehensive diversion and alternatives to incarceration programs by expanding outreach, treatment, and recovery efforts to individuals impacted by the opioid epidemic. The program also provides support to improve collaboration and strategic decision-making of regulatory and law enforcement agencies and public health officials to address prescription drug and opioid misuse, save lives, and reduce crime. The program supports the President’s Commission on Combating Drug Addiction and the Opioid Crisis by supporting state prescription drug monitoring programs, improving access to and availability of treatment services, and expanding overdose reversal programs throughout the country. The purpose of PDMP is to improve collaboration and strategic decision-making of regulatory and law enforcement agencies and public health officials to address prescription drug and opioid misuse, save lives, and reduce crime. This is made possible by collecting and analyzing controlled substance prescription data and other scheduled chemical products through a centralized database administered by an authorized state agency.

There are six categories to this grant. Applicants who will receive funding and the award amount are as follows:

Category 1: Overdose Outreach Projects. Funding is available to support communities throughout the nation that are piloting new approaches to connecting overdose survivors to services. This includes models that use law enforcement, in partnership with peer recovery coaches or treatment providers, to connect overdose survivors with services in the days that follow a non-fatal overdose.

FY 2017 Adult Drug Court and the Veterans Treatment Courts Discretionary Grant Programs

Project Description: The FY 2017 Adult Drug Court and Veterans Treatment Courts (VTC) Discretionary Grant Programs further the Attorney General’s priorities to reduce opioid abuse and support law enforcement officers, as well as other criminal justice partners, by providing tools and resources that support prevention of future crime by offenders with addictions that make them more at risk to recidivate. The Drug Court initiative also furthers the Attorney General’s priority of reducing crime by holding offenders accountable for their actions, and reducing victimization by intervening soon after arrest to prevent future crime. The VTC program also supports the Administration’s commitment to assisting veterans, including those experiencing post-traumatic stress disorder as a result of their efforts to defend their country.
